"The 'H-5' Model of Refugee Trauma and Recovery: Research Strategies and Challenges"



Richard F. Mollica, M.D.

Dr. Richard F. Mollica is a Professor of Psychiatry, Harvard Medical School (HMS) and Director of the Harvard Program in Refugee Trauma. He established with his co-founder, James Lavelle, one of the first refugee clinics in America in December 1981. Dr. Mollica and his team have been pioneers in the mental health care of highly traumatized refugees and torture survivors. He has published over 160 scientific papers and has won many awards. Currently, he directs the *Global Mental Health: Trauma and Recovery* certificate program sponsored by HMS that is in its 13 year. The GMH course currently has 700 alumni working on over 85 countries. He is the author of *Healing Invisible Wounds: Paths to Hope and Recovery in a Violent World*.

Katherine is an immigration attorney at Northern Virginia Family Service (NVFS) where she represents vulnerable immigrant populations in humanitarian and family-based cases in Immigration Court, Virginia Juvenile and Domestic Relations District Court, and before United States Citizenship and Immigration Service. She focuses much of her time fighting for asylum for clients in NVFS's Program for Survivors of Torture and Trauma. She received her law degree from Georgetown University Law Center and undergraduate degree from the University of Arkansas. Katherine is bilingual in English and Spanish, and is a member of the bars of Virginia and Washington, D.C.
